A Shared Perspective on Patriotism

Forward: This month we will memorialize 9/11. As a child, I knew little or nothing about America or its relationship to slavery. However, I held a great disdain for the United Kingdom with rabid madness based on related stories from my elders. Though I was born under the American flag my parents were of Black Danish and British descent. Six of my seven brothers (plus 1 son) served in the United States military with an

accumulated 116 years (lifers). My children, mostly girls, often ask "why"? The best-articulated answer is my quote below from Navy Commander Bobby Jones (Retired).

Commander Bobby Jones a Navy commanding officer of a riverine squadron during wartime was asked to share his thoughts on patriotism. Here is what Commander Jones had to say. Please share it with someone who needs to hear it.

I am a very blessed man you know. I have a family. We have had military history. My grandfather was a Korean War vet and my wife's grandfather was a Tuskegee Airman in World War II. The first thing I would tell people is that patriotism is not some little trait or accessory to have as a citizen. There is a difference between being a good citizen and being a patriot. To me the number one difference between a good citizen and a patriot is sacrifice. If you go and vote or clean up your local park, you go to school, you go to church, you do things you're supposed to do; congratulations, you're a good citizen. But when you give up something: time away from your family, a much more lucrative lifestyle, risk life and limb [or] your own life forfeited, those are patriots. Those that raise their hands and say they are willing to be that dude, and it is not just the military. We have people that go into burning buildings on purpose and get paid peanuts. We have law enforcement officers who are vilified, but at the same time when things go sideways, they are the first person you call, and you expect to be there. They must figure out that balance. We have people who could make more money in the medical profession but choose to go where they are called because that is what matters to them. That's patriotism.

Patriotism is putting everybody else before yourself and you are sacrificing to do it. It is that simple. Patriotism is not complaining, bitching, and moaning when something does not go your way, and then you want to rely on and wrap yourself in the flag. That is not it.

I'm going to tell you the highest proclivity to serve in America is the African American male. ... [In spite of] everything that's happened to people who look like me, we believe in those words that were put on paper, both in 1776 and then ratified in 1787 through 1789. We believe in those words [that] all men are created equal [and] you have the right to

Manassas City Mayor Holds First Ever Veterans Round Table at Post 7589

On August 20th Mayor Michelle Davis-Younger hosted the first ever Veterans Round Table at Post 7589. In attendance were members of Manassas VFW Post 7589, Manassas American Legion Posts 10 and 114, Culpeper American Legion Post 330, and Prince William County DAV Chapter15. Both VFW Post 7589 and American Legion Post 114 were founded in 1946 shortly after the end of the Second World War. Local veterans present all agreed that this was the first time in 79 years that a Manassas City elected Mayor sat down to listen to veteran issues in our community. Also present were veterans from other nearby Veteran Service Organizations, and interested individuals who had the opportunity to express their views.

A total of sixteen concerns were provided to the mayor for review and comment. Mayor Davis Younger said each would be looked into and indicated that many were outside the jurisdiction of Manassas City but would be provided as possible discussion topics at the Annual Commonwealth of Virginia Mayor's Conference. In closing Mayor Davis-Younger said she had appointed Manassas City Councilman Ralph Smith as the Veterans Point of Contact for the city. Once Manassas City VSOs have formed a Veteran's Council, that all felt necessary, Councilman Smith will meet with them to work directly on the issues the city can assist with. Mayor Davis-Younger also said, before leaving the meeting, she looked forward to the round table becoming an annual occurrence.

pursue Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness. We believe that, even when it can be argued, we have never had it. We went to defend the rights and privileges not afforded us. We fought wars while being segregated. My grandfather-inlaw came home from the war and passed through Norfolk in uniform, but could not get a sandwich in the front of a shop. He had to move to the back of a train for Nazi POWs, but he still served.

Do you see what I am saying? He still bought into the dream of what it means to be American. When I see people in their 2024 Jeep Cherokees with freaking "Don't tread on me" on the back sticker or license plates [who] never left their little area, and tell me that they are patriots, I laugh, because they have never sacrificed a damn thing for this country. Some people give to society, while others take, and right now, we have many more takers calling themselves patriots.

When I think about patriotism I think of sacrifice costing you something for people who may never even see you. Heck, I did that for people who will call me "Nigga" to my face. But I would serve again because I am a patriot. I don't just talk about it, I've had to live it. My brother almost got shot down in Afghanistan as a pilot in the Air Force, and we [are] willing do it again. That's patriotism. My daughters and niece have missed us for birthdays and special holidays. I tell them the sacrifice is worth it. That's patriotism. It's not about what you can take it's about how much you're willing to give. The thing about it is [that in] every generation of Americans we've had a group of people that did that: From the Founding Fathers that went broke when they signed the Declaration of Independence, to the kid that's 17 [and] is walking to his local recruiter in the mall saying "I'll go", even though he could do something else with his life. That's patriotism. This fake, whatever, I am upset because I did not get the dude that I wanted to be elected, that's not patriotism, that is bitching.

I am tired of it, but most importantly, our enemies Russia, China, and Iran see it and they are laughing at us. They think we no longer have true patriots. You know what, they're wrong. We're still here, hoping that the rest of the country figures itself out. We're still here but understand [that] the more we act divided [and] the more we act stupid because whatever person we wanted to support isn't the one the whole country [wants, things] fall apart. ... Get out of your feelings to understand what America is supposed to be. We have not gotten there yet, no, but that is the beauty of this country. We can continue the journey to be the best country ever, which makes us America, not because we are perfect but because we know we are not perfect. We keep trying to make it better. Just because your damn feelings are hurt, because you lost a damn election, because you don't want to say you lost something, nobody's got time for that, especially now. So yes, patriotism seems to be the word of the day for many people. But to quote Marshawn Lynch "I'm about that action boss I could care less about what you think, show me!"

Hundreds of thousands have sacrificed or lost their lives in the belief that no individual is above the country or its people who he/she serves!

Observed Lessons of Filing a Veteran's Administration Claim

I have been retired for 13 years and submitted my original claim in 2010 followed by two supplemental claims. Some of the lessons I learned may have you scratching your head with a (No s--t Sherlock) quip. There is plenty of information, however, we do not know what we do not know. Often the smartest among us find themselves having to resubmit several claims to get earned benefits. Their promises and what we get don't always equate.

- The veteran is responsible for all information submitted; our Veteran Service Officers (VSO) can only be as good as the info
 received.
- NO VETERAN IS REQUIRED TO PAY FOR FILING A VA CLAIM! Nor do you have to be a member of any veteran service organization (helpful to be)
- A lawyer or anyone requiring payment is seldom needed (Difficult appeals).
- Your medical records must support the illness being claimed. It would be best if you verified the info before sitting down with VSO.
- Ask your doctor (s) for associated/symptoms that may create other health issues. BIG*
- Be aware of the DSM-IV terminology, codes, and required forms to file.
- The VA claim office is not our enemy but don't expect favors.
- Understand service-connected vs presumptive illness.

Compensation and Pension

- Attend all requested medical evaluations promptly.
- Again! The examiner is not an enemy, however, what you say influences your success. Lying could be costly to your well-being and benefits!
- Request someone who has some expertise related to your illness.
- You have the right to appeal any denial of illness.
- VA math is different, YouTube or good VSO for better understanding!
- Appeal annually for any claim denied, or you'll lose retroactive payment if illness changes for the worse.
- VSO may have good intentions but it's your life, so seek another opinion if you're unsure. All legitimate veteran organizations have claim representatives or know where/how to get one.
- Keep a family member aware of your DD214/215, medical records, and health issues.
- Understand the lengthy process (6 mos. 2 yrs), start early, and be vigilant with lots of patience.
- You are your best advocate; the VSOs and the VA's claim offices are inundated with caseloads. Do due diligence in your claim process, and if possible, get a va.gov account and be ahead of the game.
- The process could be exhausting, difficult, and slow. Family members could be left trying to navigate a system without the knowledge of where to start.
- Finally! Some veterans become prey for Claim Sharks because they fear or dislike having to be associated with one of the VSOs. Again, you don't have to be a member of a VSO for us to perform our mission.

I WOULD BE REMISS TO OMIT THAT YOUR PARTICIPATION BENEFITS THE ORGANIZATION AND ALL VETERANS. The SYNERGY in numbers often forces politicians to stop the assault on benefits earned.

Joint Leadership Council Report



The Joint Leadership Council (JLC) was instrumental in advocating for the repeal of VMSDEP restrictions introduced in the Virginia budget. A working group has been empowered to examine funding going forward after the 2-year extension of the program. The VFW and JLC are represented in the working group.

The JLC held an interim legislative committee meeting on August 11 to

review proposed initiatives submitted for the next legislative session. Among those being considered is the effort to ban Claim Sharks in Virginia (VFW). We already have two sponsors for the proposed legislation: Senator Danica Roem and Representative Brianna Sewell. Doug Hoffman has been working closely with the JLC and in addition to enlisting Delegate Sewell's support, has provided valuable input. This issue will likely be our top priority when indicatives are prioritized at the next JLC meeting.

I also want to credit my alternate, Joanne Smith from Post 9808 for her support. She has been able to attend committee hearings on short notice to ensure a VFW presence.

Additional proposed initiatives being considered are:

- Virginia National Guard Tuition payment revisions (Virginia National Guard Association)
- Suffolk State Veterans Cemetery Expansion (Virginia National Guard Association)
- Establish a Veterans Education Program (Student Veterans Association)
- Establishment of Women Veterans Day (Student Veterans Association)
- Verification of Veteran Status Jails and Prisons (American Legion)
- Veteran Treatment Dockets and Marriage Commissioners (National Vet Court Alliance)

Two other proposed initiatives will likely prompt letters of support from the JLC:

- Restoring the Virginia War Memorial Carillon
- Medal of Honor Memorial on Monument Avenue

The next meeting of the JLC is scheduled for September 19 at the Virginia War Memorial starting at 10:00 AM and is open to the public. The meeting will be held in the conference room located on Level 2.

VFW Takes Exception With Service Record Embellishment

The following is a message from VFW National Commander Al Lipphardt

WASHINGTON (Aug. 8, 2024) — "I have always said those who have raised their right hand to support and defend the Constitution of the United States and donned the military uniform in service to our country deserve our respect. This is why I chose to highlight in a statement yesterday the military service of the vice presidential nominees selected by both major parties for the November election.

Since yesterday, I have watched the vitriol thrown around from veterans online diminishing both candidates' service. It's an ugly look for our community but is nothing new. We saw this type of mudslinging during the general election 20 years ago. However, I have heard the outrage over reports of military service record embellishment, something I take exception with. To that point, I feel it is important to reiterate in no uncertain terms the VFW's position on false service claims, whether that person is running for political office or not.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars will not tolerate any individual who embellishes their military service for personal gain. If this is you, then you need to fix yourself.

As the nation's largest and oldest major war veterans service organization, we are proud of the fact that every one of our members deployed to conflicts overseas at least once during their time in uniform. Many of our members have seen combat, have fought on the field of battle and shed blood in defense of freedom around the world. We don't have to make ourselves or our service more than it was. The campaign medals, combat ribbons, combat badges, and scars we wear speak for themselves.

As the gap of time widens between major wars, so too does the divide between those who have served and those who have not. It is up to all veterans to remind the rest of America of the sacrifices made on their behalf and help them to understand what military service means. If you wore the uniform of the US military at any point in your life, be honest about your service and accomplishments. No matter what you did while you were in, what rank achieved or whether you served 4 or 24 years, you will always be able to say with pride and dignity that you did what your country asked you to do."

VFW Admonishes Former President for Medal of Honor Remarks

The following is a message from VFW National Commander Al Lipphardt

WASHINGTON (Aug. 16, 2024) — "On Thursday, former President Donald Trump spoke at an event where he made some flippant remarks about the Medal of Honor and the heroes who have received it. In the video that has circulated online and in the media, the former president was recognizing Miriam Adelson in the audience who he awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom during his time in office. As he described the medal as the civilian version of the Medal of Honor, he went on to opine that the Medal of Freedom was "much better" than the military's top award, because those awarded the latter are, in his words, "... either in very bad shape because they've been hit so many times by bullets or they're dead." He continued by comparing Miriam to MoH recipients saying, "She gets it and she's a healthy beautiful woman. They are rated equal."

These asinine comments not only diminish the significance of our nation's highest award for valor, but also crassly characterizes the sacrifices of those who have risked their lives above and beyond the call of duty.

When a candidate to serve as our military's commander-in-chief so brazenly dismisses the valor and reverence symbolized by the Medal of Honor and those who have earned it, I must question whether they would discharge their responsibilities to our men and women in uniform with the seriousness and discernment necessary for such a powerful position. It is even more disappointing when these comments come from a man who already served in this noble office and should frankly already know better.

While the Presidential Medal of Freedom maybe our nation's highest civilian award, the Medal of Honor is more sacred as it represents the gallantry and intrepidity of courageous and selfless service members, often at the cost of grievous wounds and even their lives. It's because of our Medal of Honor recipients that great Americans like Miriam Adelson have the freedom to live to their fullest potential and make such lasting contributions to our great nation.

We would like to remind Mr. Trump that the 12 times he had the honor of awarding the Medal of Honor as president of the United States, those were heroes not of his own choosing. He bestowed those medals on behalf of Congress, representing all Americans of a grateful nation. We hold the donation of their lives in service to our country in the highest esteem, and so should he."

VFW Elects Al Lipphardt as New National Commander

The Georgia native urges members to have courage and to 'believe in what you do – do what you believe in'

LOUISVILLE, Ky., (Aug. 1, 2024) — Alfred "Al" Lipphardt, a Georgia native and veteran of the Vietnam War, was elected today as the new national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), a congressionally chartered veterans service organization comprised of more than 1.4 million eligible veterans and military service members from all six branches of the armed forces. Lipphardt's assumption of command took place during the VFW's 125th National Convention in Louisville, Kentucky.

"I am deeply humbled to stand before you today having been elected and installed to the highest office of the Veterans of For-

eign Wars of the United States, commander-in-chief," said Lipphardt. "Standing on the shoulders of those who have gone before us, the founders from the Spanish American War followed by World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom and deployments placing you between the weapons of our enemies and these shores."

Lipphardt delivered remarks as the

VFW's 116th commander-in-chief to those attending in person at the Kentucky International Convention Center and watching via livestreaming video, at the conclusion of the weeklong gathering. Approximately 10,000 members of the VFW and its Auxiliary converged on the city to conduct the business of the organization, recognize individuals and organizations for excellence and to elect new leadership for the 2024–2025 year. The last time the VFW held its national convention in Louisville was 2013.

In his address, Lipphardt gave his vision for the year, which he deems "Operation All In," calling on all levels of the organization to embrace courage and the warrior spirit that sets the VFW apart as the oldest and largest combat veterans organization.

"Veterans of Foreign Wars Posts are some of the very few places where heroes gather, and warriors meet," said Lipphardt. "Too many people in this nation have forgotten what it is to be a warrior. Heroes are what others think of us. Warriors are who we are."

VFW membership eligibility requires honorable service in a war or expedition on foreign soil or in hostile waters. Lipphardt served in the United States Army from 1965 to 1979. He earned his VFW eligibility by serving in Vietnam from 1967 to 1968, and from 1970 to 1971. In recognition of his service, he received the Combat Infantryman Badge, Bronze Star with Valor device, Bronze Star Medal for Meritorious Service, Purple Heart Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, and the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal with

Silver Star and two Bronze Stars, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm Medal, and the Vietnam Staff Service Medal First Class.

Throughout Lipphardt's speech, he reflected on those he served with in the Army, veterans within his family, and how they influenced his life. A solemn moment came when he spoke the names of the ones he lost during the Vietnam War.

"Pvt. Lewis Sloan of East Point, Georgia, Cpl. Kenneth Adams of Santa Clara, California, Cpl. Philip Adams of Croton Falls, New York, Robert Waddell of Batavia, Ohio, and Rodney Loatman of Newark, New Jersey." said Lipphardt. "These men served under my command when they paid the ultimate price for freedom. I promised myself, those who gave their full measure of devotion would be honored for their service and sacrifice by saying their names whenever I had an opportunity."

Lipphardt's remarks harkened back to core tenants of the VFW, as well as its stated vision – ensure that veterans are respected for their service, always receive their earned entitlements, and are recognized for the sacrifices they and their loved ones have made on behalf of this great country.

"I have only been a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars for 20 years, but I have seen too many members who have forgotten our

roots," said Lipphardt. "Whatever the branch, whatever the military specialty, or whenever the conflict, let us never forget those who no longer have a voice."

Lipphardt joined the VFW in 2002 when he became a charter member of VFW Post 12002 in North Fulton, Georgia. He later transferred his Gold Legacy Life membership to his current post VFW Post 2667 in Newnan, Georgia. He has served in elected and appointed positions at the Post, District and Department levels, culminating with his election as the VFW Department of Georgia commander from 2014 to 2015, in which he achieved Triple Crown All-American commander status. On the national level, he has served on the Legislative Committee, the National Security and Foreign Affairs Committee, and the Council of Administration.

"You and I know membership is more than about numbers," said Lipphardt. "We are not numbers, we are people. I am proud to share with my community – I am a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars."

Lipphardt is a member of the Rotary Club of Stone Mountain, Georgia, American Legion, and life member of the Disabled American Veterans, Military Order of the Purple Heart, the VFW National Home for Children, the 196th Light Infantry Brigade, and an inductee to the United States Army Officer Candidate School Alumni Association Hall of Fame. He received his Bache-

lor of Science degree in business administration from Pacific Western University in 1990.

Much of Lipphardt's remarks after being installed as commander -in-chief emphasized a commitment to values and valuing service to the nation. He also spoke about the importance of integrity within the organization.

"If your word is not to be trusted, everything and anything you do is unreliable. You can't be called on nor can you be counted on," said Lipphardt. "There is no place in the Veterans of Foreign Wars for these individuals."

In addition to Lipphardt, other national officers elected were Carol Whitmore, an Iraq War veteran from the Department of Iowa, as senior vice commander-in-chief, and Timothy Peters, a Persian Gulf War veteran from the Department of Montana, as junior vice commander-in-chief. The final day of the convention also saw Adjutant General Dan West and Quartermaster General Marc Garduno reconfirmed in their positions.

"My ask is for you to embrace the vision of courage," said Lipphardt. "Rekindle the warrior's fire in your belly. Put that vision into action. I am proud to lead you, as together, we seek the courage to be the best we can be in all things and at all times.



VFW submitted its fourth Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to VA requesting documentation about unaccredited companies that provide services to claimants seeking VA benefits. We have received two interim responses from VA to date on this request and anticipate additional responses to be forthcoming. Among the documents provided is a letter sent to a company called REE Medical, dated January 4, 2024, in which VA points out that REE Medical is prohibited from assisting in the "preparation, presentation, or prosecution of VA benefits claims." VA requested a response from REE Medical within 30-days of receipt of the letter to address the concerns raised in the letter. No response was provided in the documents received.


