Commander's Message



Sometimes the most wonderful program in the world is operating a stone's throw away and you are clueless! I want to introduce you to "Warrior's Retreat at Bull Run," the flagship program of the "Serve our Willing Warriors"

organization located in Haymarket, Va.

In a nutshell, this is a beautiful 11,000 square foot, 5-bedroom home located on 37 acres of land in the hills of extreme western Prince William County, Va., but it is not remote. It is only about 3 miles from busy U.S. 15 in Haymarket but it seems a world away from the traffic and pressure of daily life and traffic in Prince



William.

Quite simply, this is a retreat for members of the U.S. Armed forces returning from battle. It is a place they can take 3 to 7day mini vacations, with their families, and try and reconnect after serving our country in Iraq, Afghanistan or wherever. As you scan the warriors who have visited you will see young men and women in perfect physical condition and then you will see young warriors with limbs missing or other terrible wounds. This is a place for them to forget war and maybe attempt to get to know their families once again.

This retreat is supported by a Board of Directors and many, many sponsors and friends. The warriors have gourmet food and first-class hotel accommodations for themselves and their families during their retreat which usually runs Wednesday to Sunday although that can vary. It is one family at a time so that privacy is assured. Close by are tourist attractions like the Bull Run Battlefield, movie theaters, shopping areas and recreation for children and adults.

I went on a tour of the house with a number of local sponsors on an evening in early September. The house dates from 1977 and is on the edge of Bull Run Mountain Conservancy. There was a two-year renovation leading to the official opening on Veteran's Day, 2015. "Serve Our Willing Warriors" says it was a two-year job to remodel the home. Over 900 volunteers, ranging in age from 9 to 92 took part. 150 contracting and material supply companies



donated 1.1 million dollars' worth of material and several hundred skilled tradesmen worked on the home at one time or another and continue to work and maintain it.

There are five bedroom suites, a gourmet kitchen, game room, physical therapy and massage therapy rooms, and a library. Outside there is a stone patio with fire pit, a playground, BBQ area, vegetable garden, serenity garden and walking trails. All of this was created by local people in the Haymarket area who wanted to help members of the Armed Forces who had put themselves in harm's way for our country. Over 100 professional contractors donated labor and material worth over \$1 million to make this happen. Since 2015, hundreds of volunteers have given thousands of hours to make this a unique success.

How did it get started? In 2012 Pastor Barry White of Park Valley Church in Haymarket challenged his congregation to find a community need and take steps to address that need. He wanted a report in 30 days of their experiences and they would share their stories with each other. This group eventually visited recovering soldiers at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington and Fort Belvoir. This turned into gift giving at holidays, cookouts in the summer and soon the establishment of "Serve Our Willing Warriors."

John and Shirley Dominik formally established the organization as a not for profit 501c3. The immediate goal was to get the wounded warriors away from the clinical hospital environment for a time to refresh their minds and bond with their families again and just generally renew their spirits. It was aimed at warriors with physical and mental wounds.

As you tour the house, you see photos of mostly young soldiers with young families and many children. It is a place for families.

It is an example of what can be done with volunteers and not for profit incentive. The work continues of course and there is a constant need for volunteers of all types from cooks to custodians. The website is <u>www.willingwarriors.org</u> and the phone number is 866-227-5853. The location is 16013 Waterfall Road just off U.S. 15 in Haymarket.

How did VFW Post 7589 get involved? Local Boy Scout Sean Kellogg had an idea to further beautify the already spectacular grounds. He wanted to build a bridge, over a low wet area of the walking trails, for an Eagle Scout project. He started from nothing with planning and then the actual construction on weekends and after school. The bridge took shape and was

finished this past Spring. He wrote to us for some financial help and we voted to give him \$100.00. Many other groups and businesses in the Manassas/Haymarket area did the same and the job got done.

VFW National Commander Opposes Flag Disrespect

'I stand for our flag and anthem. I kneel for our fallen.'

WASHINGTON (September 25, 2017) –The national commander of America's largest and oldest major combat veterans organization is raising his voice in opposition to those who disrespect the flag.

"There is a time and place for civil debate, and wearing team jerseys and using sporting events to disrespect our country doesn't wash with millions of military veterans who have and continue to wear real uniforms on real battlefields around the globe," said Keith Harman, a Vietnam combat veteran who leads the 1.7 million-member Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S. and its Auxiliary.

"My oath to protect the Constitution also protects my right to vehemently disagree with how others may choose to air their grievances," said Harman, who said those who disrespect what most Americans hold dear have forgotten that America is still in



a 16-year, multi-front war, against a shadow enemy whose end goal is the total destruction of us as a people and country.

The VFW national commander is saluting former Army Ranger and now Pittsburgh Steeler offensive tackle Alejandro Villanueva for showing the rest of his team and the league what true mettle is, and NASCAR team owners Richard Petty and Richard Childress for leading from the front.

"I stand for our flag and anthem," he said, "and I kneel for our fallen. That's what patriots do. We rally around the flag of our country, not use it and our Constitution as both shield and sword."







Vietnam Green Beret to Receive Medal of Honor: The White House announced Wednesday that President Trump will present the Medal of Honor on Oct. 23 to a retired Army Green Beret, who is credited with saving multiple lives during a covert four-day mission into Laos. Capt. Gary Michael Rose had received the Distinguished Service Cross in 1971, just four months after the Special Forces mission in which he survived bullet and rocket wounds and a helicopter crash to provide lifesaving aid to more than 100 comrades. Soldiers who served with him, as well as lawmakers and Pentagon officials, lobbied for several years to upgrade his DSC, which required a special waiver passed by Congress and presidential approval.

VA Releases New Veteran Suicide Data: The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) recently released a more comprehensive analysis of veteran suicide data. After working with the Department of Defense, as well as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, to gather data for the most extensive veteran suicide study ever conducted, VA found last year that an average of 20 veterans die by suicide on a daily basis. Of those 20, only six were actively enrolled in VA — meaning those six had actively used VA or enrolled within the system sometime within a year of their death. Suicide is currently the 10th leading cause of death in the United States and rates of suicide are continuing to increase. The veteran population is currently overrepresented in suicide deaths. While many believe it is younger veterans of the Post-9/11 era who deployed to Iraq or Afghanistan that are dying by suicide at the highest rates within the veteran community, it is actually veterans who did not deploy and are 50 years old or older. This newly released data from VA does an analysis of veteran suicide broken down at the state level. Read and reiew the data reports: https://www.mentalhealth.va.gov/

FY 2018 National Defense Authorization Act: On Monday, the Senate voted 89-8 to overwhelmingly pass their version of the 2018 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). The Senate version authorizes \$700 billion in total - \$640 billion for the Pentagon's base budget, and \$60 billion to sustain ongoing operations in Afghanistan, Iraq and Syria. Included in the Senate version is a 2.1 percent pay increase for service members; \$8.5 billion to strengthen missile defense; 24 additional F -35 joint strike fighters; 10 additional Boeing F/A-18 Super Hornets; five more Navy ships; and end-strength increases of 6,000 soldiers and 1,000 Marines. In light of this, the Senate version still includes TRICARE fee increases, which the VFW strongly opposes, and is \$83 billion above authorized budget caps for military spending. The House and Senate will meet next week to resolve any differences between their versions of the bill. Stay tuned to the Action Corps Weekly for updates on this important bill.

Free VA Caregiver Course Available Online: The Department of Veterans Affairs partnered with PsychArmor Institute to provide a free online course to break down VA's Caregiver Program. The course takes approximately 10 minutes and includes information about how VA is organized, who is eligible for the Caregiver Program, how to enroll in it, what documents are needed and where to apply. The course also offers tips and guidance on what actions to take after enrollment is complete, and what resources are available to help veterans and their caregivers. New functions on the VFW website

When a visitor goes to www.vfw.org in their browser, one of the first links they will see at the top of the page is "Find A Post". Clicking on this link takes the visitor to a page where they can enter a ZIP code or city and state and then search by distance for VFW Posts in the area. They will see the name of the Post, with address and phone number, as well as when meetings are held, the names of the Commander and Quartermaster, and now the dues amount for the Post.

This is obviously useful information for veterans looking to connect with a local Post, but it is also useful information for you as a recruiter looking to connect veterans with a Post in their area. If you run across a veteran who might be interested in VFW membership but isn't local to your Post, you can assist them by looking up their local Post, letting them know who to contact and when meetings are, and how much the dues will be. Remember, we are one team and one VFW and bringing a new member on board - even if it's not to your Post - helps our mission.

In addition, when a VFW member logs into the website, on the right hand side of the MY VFW page you will see two new links under the heading "Get Your Digital Membership Card". Both Apple and Android smart phones offer the option to save various cards and passes to a digital "wallet", so that instead of carrying around a dozen physical membership cards, discount cards, etc., they can all be kept on your phone. The VFW now offers this option for your membership card!

If you have an Apple or Android device, simply browse to this page on that device and click on either the "Add to Apple Wallet" button (iPhone or iPad) or the "Add to WalletPasses" button (Android) and it will go through the process of adding a digital version of your VFW membership card to your device.

This will not replace the physical VFW membership card - we will still be sending out membership cards to all our Annual and Life members. This is intended as another option for our members' convenience. When asked to show a VFW membership card, a member can either produce their physical card out of their wallet or display their digital card on their smart phone.

VA Appeals Reform Starts October 1st

The long-awaited reform to how a VA claim is appealed will start on October 1st, 2017 and will roll-out over 18 months. The new process will allow those who currently have an appeal pending, more than 300,000 total at all levels, to move into the new system. The important thing to remember is that this process does protect a veteran's right to appeal, it does shorten the length of time for the appeal to happen, and the VFW helped shape the program. Appeals currently take as much as 10 years (depending on far your appeal has gone). Those who are close to a decision on their appeal will not be notified as it could be like re-starting and VA does not want that.

You will receive a notice, by mail, <u>ONLY</u> if you qualify to move into the new process. The first batch of letters, some 500, go out on October 1st and the process will build to notifying veterans monthly with an eventual goal of 20,000 or more letters a month

VFW National Legislative Conference

On 12 and 13 September, 2017 members of the VFW's National Legislative Committee visited the "Hill" in Washington, D. C. to discuss a variety of concerns with the members of the Senate and House of Representatives. The Virginia contingent, Dan Boyer (VFW-7726) and Doc Crouch (VFW-3150), attended meetings in the offices of ALL of our elected national legislators; sometimes meeting with staff members but in a number of cases with the representatives themselves.

Our broad legislative needs are outlined in the 2017 Priority Goals which are based on the resolutions which are voted on and passed by the membership at our national convention. Certain of these goals were selected for special emphasis and point papers were developed to expand on our concerns. Along with that, and true to the VFW's work ethic where there is a problem that needs to be addressed, we brought forth a proposed solution.

First and foremost is **sequestration**, which is not only severely hampering the Department of Defense (DOD) and the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) but all government agencies. It must come to an end NOW. Other immediate areas of concern were: DOD's attempt to put forward **TRICARE Fee Increases** in the Defense Appropriation Bill, the need for improvements in

VFW Unmet Needs Program Tops \$2M Almost 900 families helped over past year

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (September 12, 2017) – The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S. is proud to announce its Unmet Needs program set a new record by awarding more than \$2 million in financial assistance grants to nearly 900 military and veteran families during its 2016-2017 program year. The new record shatters last year's program record of \$550,000 being distributed to 184 families.

"The VFW Unmet Needs program continues to touch many lives every day," said VFW National Commander Keith Harman, who explained that the program provides up to \$5,000 to veterans, service members and their families during times of financial going out. The slower start will allow VA to address problems with smaller numbers of claims instead of having to face a huge problem which derails the entire system. Also, if you choose to move to the new process, you will not be allowed to move back.

overall Veterans Health Care, addressing the needs of veterans have been subjected to Toxic Exposure of varying substances, the needed improvements to the VA Caregiver Program, DOD policies and congresses intent on Veterans Preference in the government workplace, Concurrent Receipt as it affects not only retired veterans but their surviving spouses. Also discussed were 24 additional bills currently making their way through the U. S. Congress.

Copies of the 2017 Priority Goals and the Fall 2017 Legislative Priorities point papers have been provided to each Post with the request that it be shared with the members – VFW and Auxiliary. A breakdown (as of 22 September) of the forty legislative bills cited in the point papers has been prepared and it indicates which of our legislators have signed on as co-sponsors of those individual pieces of legislation. A copy of this breakdown has been provided to each Post in Virginia. Also, each Post has been provided with a listing that provides information on where each legislator is located and their contact info, not only in D.C. but also their local offices.

hardship. The one-time assistance is awarded in the form of a grant, not a loan, so there is no repayment requirement. Since its inception in 2004, the VFW Unmet Needs program has provided nearly \$8 million in financial assistance to more than 4,850 military and veteran families. The program is supported entirely by generous donations from VFW members and supporters, and corporate sponsors like BURGER KING[®] franchise owners.

"Those who have worn the uniform have sacrificed enough" said Harman. "Panicking over whether to fix the car, replace the hot water heater, or put food on the table, are stresses they don't need. I am proud the VFW has a program that gives them a place to turn to when they need it most."


