#### Manassas Fall Jubilee a hit for Post 7589

On October 7 Manassas Post 7589 and its Auxiliary had displays at the Manassas Fall Jubilee. An annual event in Manassas on the first Saturday in October, this year continued the Post's participation over more than a decade. The Jubilee started at 10:00 AM and ran until 5 PM. Over 25,000 people typically attend each year.

The Post actively recruits and also distributes Halloween Trick-or-Treat bags to children in the community. Each bag is imprinted with a message of how to be safe while out collecting treats. Additionally, this year we inserted a tooth brush into each bag, supplied by Lou Filipppone, one of our Post Trustees.

The Auxiliary recruits new members and awards children a certificate for correctly reciting the "Pledge of Allegiance".

An additional focus this year was to promote mental health awareness and invite the public to attend a screening of the film "Into the Light" on October 28th. We provided information on how to recognize the five signs of mental issues. The public seemed very tuned in to our campaign and was especially aware of the high suicide rate among veterans.

We recruited 2 new members, had 1 transfer and a member stopped by to renew his membership. The Auxiliary also had several new applicants.

The weather cooperated with sunny skies and temperatures in the 80s. It was a very successful event.

Topics. The 442 page book covers new material such as abuse of alcohol, treatment of wounded soldiers, venereal disease, reasons and types of discipline of soldiers and much more.

Paul retired as a USAF Lt Col Personnel Officer after 23 years of service. He served in Vietnam from 1971-1972 with duties to withdraw USAF forces from the country. Paul's younger brother Joel, who is a twice wounded and highly decorated Vietnam Veteran, serves

as Post 7589 Chaplain. Both Paul and Joel descend from five Patriots who fought in the Revolution from Connecticut and New Hampshire.

Paul serves as the Color Guard Commander of the award winning Colonel William Grayson Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) located in Prince William County. The Colonel Grayson Chapter is the second largest of the 26 SAR chapters in Virginia with over 200 members.

The SAR like the VFW is a community service organization which promotes patriotism, service above self, respect for law and our Constitution and support for those in need. All royalties from Paul's book are going to the SAR activities.

In addition to his SAR and VFW duties Paul serves as the Secretary of the Manassas area Inter-Service Club Council which coordinates multiple community service organizations. #### Veteran's History Project Launches Last Installment of WWI Series

The Veterans History Project (VHP) [has] launched "A World Overturned," The final chapter in a three-part, online website series titled "Experiencing War," dedicated to U.S. veterans of the First World War.

'A World Overturned" highlights the digitized stories of eight veterans, exploring how World War I forever changed their lives, shared through original photographs, letters, diaries, memoirs and other materials. This series has been presented as a companion site to the Library exhibit "Echoes of the Great War."

One of several profiles featured in the series, Roland Neel survived the dangerous early days of aviation as an aerial observer, but his brother, Joseph, was killed in action at the Battle of St. Mihiel.

Before enlisting, Reese Russell was accustomed to the quiet rhythms of rural life. He was gassed during combat and was never the same. Reese's daughter, who donated his diary posthumously,

said her father slept too little and drank too much after the war. He died impoverished at the age of 61.

During his service with the 89th Division in France and GermanY, Hubert Wesselman expressed concerns about the long -term impact of his wartime experiences, but professional support for service members returning from battle was largely unavailable at the time. He struggled to cope with the horrors he suffered. Tragically, after enduring war, the Great Depression and years of strenuous work as a farmer, Hubert took his own life.


## Two local VFW Posts suspend showing NFL games

Veterans ID Cards Update: VA will begin issuing veteran identification cards to all honorably discharged veterans in November. The initiative is required by the Veterans Identification Card Act 2015, which ordered VA to issue a hard-copy photo ID to any honorably discharged veteran who applies. The card will be issued for free upon request, according to a Military.com article, and will contain the veteran's name, photo and a non-Social Security identification number. VA will provide additional information once finalized.

Take the VFW Survey on TRICARE: Last year's National Defense Authorization Act contained a number of changes to TRICARE, most of which take effect Jan. 1, 2018. The VFW believes service members, veterans and their families must be able to voice how these changes will impact them. To ensure your views and preferences are heard, the VFW has developed a survey to gauge our members' awareness of these changes and how they will affect beneficiaries. The data collected will be used to advocate for policy and legislative changes that are based on the needs of TRICARE beneficiaries. Congress Authorizes COLA Increase for Veterans: On Wednesday, the Senate passed H.R. 1329, the Veterans' Compensation Cost-of-Living Adjustment Act of 2017. This legislation would increase the rates of VA disability compensation, dependency compensation for surviving children and spouses, as well as the clothing allowance for veterans. This increase is based on the yearly cost-of-living adjustment increase that Social Security recipients receive, which is determined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Consumer Price Index. Earlier this year, the House passed H.R. 1329, which now waits President Trump's signature. Once signed into law, the expected 2 percent increase will become effective on Jan. 1, 2018.

VFW Testifies on VA Health Care, Choice Program: On Tuesday, the VFW testified before the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs on pending health care legislation. Secretary of Veterans Affairs Dr. David Shulkin testified for VA. The VFW discussed the future of VA's Choice Program and consolidating community care programs. Other legislation included topics such as organ transplants, nursing homes, sexual trauma and suicide.

VFW Testifies on VA Overpayments and Debt Management: The House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs held a hearing this week to discuss how VA can effectively prevent and manage overpayments. VFW National Legislative Service Deputy Director John Towles offered the VFW's position on the issue and highlighted several common-sense steps that could be taken by VA to prevent and properly manage overpayments, including en-



suring that the contact information VA is using to notify veterans of overpayments is up-to-date; clarifying the eligibility for a debt waiver; outlining in easy-to-understand terms the steps that should be taken to request a payment plan for legitimate overpayments; ensuring that VA suspends all recoupment efforts once a veteran appeals a debt recoupment decision; and ensuring that regional office and debt management staff are trained to conduct proper due diligence, and are better trained in VA's debt management and collections procedures and protocols.

VFW Attends Blue Water Agent Orange Roundtable: On Wednesday, the VFW attended a roundtable with nearly a dozen veteran and military service organizations, congressional staffers, and veterans impacted by Agent Orange. The roundtable focused on the need to expand presumptive coverage for an estimated 90,000 veterans, as the needed legislation awaits congressional action. The VFW has testified in support of the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2017 several times and is working with VA and Congress to ensure benefits are expanded to Blue Water Navy veterans without eroding other veteran benefits. Additionally, the VFW continues to reaffirm its support for these veterans through the annual adoption of a resolution at the VFW National Convention calling for expansion of Agent Orange presumptive benefits to Blue Water Navy veterans. Stay tuned to the VFW Action Corps Weekly for more updates on this vital topic.

Filipino Vets Awarded Congressional Gold Medal: The service and sacrifice of Filipino veterans from World War II were honored this week with the highest award Congress can provide: the Congressional Gold Medal. It was awarded to recognize the collective efforts of some 250,000 Filipino soldiers who served honorably in an active duty status between July 26, 1941, and Dec. 31, 1946, under the command of the U.S. Army Forces in the Far East within the Philippine Commonwealth Army, the Philippine Scouts, the Philippine Constabulary, recognized guerrilla units, the New Philippine Scouts, the First Filipino Infantry Regiment, the Second Filipino Infantry Battalion (Separate), and the First Reconnaissance Battalion, including those commanding or serving as U.S. military officers or enlisted soldiers. Passage of the legislation, sponsored by U.S. Sens. Mazie Hirono (D-Hawaii) and Dean Heller (R-Nev.), accomplishes VFW Resolution 305, which was passed at the 116th VFW National Convention in Pittsburgh. Previous military recipients of the Congressional Gold Medal have been the Tuskegee Airmen, Women Airforce Service Pilots, the 65th Infantry Regiment, Doolittle Raiders, Montford Point Marines, Native American Code Talkers, and the 100th Infantry Battalion, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the Military Intelligence Service, among many others.



House National Guard and Reserve Caucus: On Tuesday, the VFW attended a National Guard and Reserve Components Caucus at the House of Representatives. Director, Army National Guard, Lt. Gen. Timothy J. Kadavy and Chief of Army Reserve Lt. Gen. Charles D. Luckey, spoke about how the Total Force Policy is changing the demands on the reserve component. Both generals also addressed questions regarding how this change could impact employment of National Guard and Reserve members in the civilian/corporate sector and some of the limitations of the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA), the federal law that establishes rights and responsibilities for uniformed service members and their civilian employers.

VA Women Veterans Summit Webinars: In August, Hurricane Harvey forced the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to cancel the majority of events scheduled for their National Women Veterans Summit held in Houston, Texas. Consequently, VA will be hosting live webinars for discussions and panels that were cancelled. The webinars will be available to watch and/or livestream from VA's website beginning Oct. 23. Topics to be covered will include employment, health care, local and federal resources and more.

Senate Committee Advances BVA, NCA, Enterprise Integration Nominees: On Wednesday, the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs voted to advance the nominations of Melissa Sue Glynn to serve as VA assistant secretary for Enterprise Integration, Cheryl L. Mason to be chairman of the Board of Veterans' Appeals (BVA), and Randy Reeves to be VA undersecretary for the National Cemetery Administration (NCA). The nomination hearing was held on Oct. 4, 2017. Nominees now await confirmation by the full Senate.



#### New functions on the VFW website

When a visitor goes to www.vfw.org in their browser, one of the first links they will see at the top of the page is "Find A Post". Clicking on this link takes the visitor to a page where they can enter a ZIP code or city and state and then search by distance for VFW Posts in the area. They will see the name of the Post, with address and phone number, as well as when meetings are held, the names of the Commander and Quartermaster, and now the dues amount for the Post.

This is obviously useful information for veterans looking to connect with a local Post, but it is also useful information for you as a recruiter looking to connect veterans with a Post in their area. If you run across a veteran who might be interested in VFW membership but isn't local to your Post, you can assist them by looking up their local Post, letting them know who to contact and when meetings are, and how much the dues will be. Remember, we are one team and one VFW and bringing a new member on board - even if it's not to your Post - helps our mission.

In addition, when a VFW member logs into the website, on the right hand side of the MY VFW page you will see two new links under the heading "Get Your Digital Membership Card". Both Apple and Android smart phones offer the option to save various cards and passes to a digital "wallet", so that instead of carrying around a dozen physical membership cards, discount cards, etc., they can all be kept on your phone. The VFW now offers this option for your membership card!

If you have an Apple or Android device, simply browse to this page on that device and click on either the "Add to Apple Wallet" button (iPhone or iPad) or the "Add to WalletPasses" button (Android) and it will go through the process of adding a digital version of your VFW membership card to your device.

This will not replace the physical VFW membership card - we will still be sending out membership cards to all our Annual and Life members. This is intended as another option for our members' convenience. When asked to show a VFW membership card, a member can either produce their physical card out of their wallet or display their digital card on their smart phone.

## Ground broken for Puller Veterans Care Center

At a ceremony attended by many members of the veterans community and Fauquier County officials the long struggle to build a Northern Virginia veterans care center finally came to fruition. On October 24, Virginia Governor Terry McAuliffe led a group of 22 dignitaries in breaking ground for the new Puller Veterans Care Center at Vint Hill.

Chesty Puller VFW Post 1503 in Dale City opened the ceremony with a color guard and presentation of the colors. That was followed by the National Anthem sung by Ms. Carrie Ann Alford and the Pledge of Allegiance led by Ms. Martha Puller Downs. Commissioner John Newby of the Virginia Department of Veterans Services served as master of ceremonies. Speakers included Fauquier County Board of Supervisors Chairman Richard Gerhardt, Virginia House of Delegates members Scott Lingamfelter and Rich Anderson and Virginia Senator Bryce Reeves. The keynote address was delivered by Governor Terry McAuliffe.

Members of Warrenton VFW Post 9835 and Manassas Park Post 1811 were in attendance as were State Commander Mike Boehme, State Junior Vice Commander Rick Raskin and District 10 Commander Chuck Wilson. It was also a pleasure to see retired Virginia Commissioner of Veterans Affairs Vince Burgess attending.

Scheduled for completion in early 2020, the Puller Veterans Care Center will be built on the former Vint Hill Farms Station in Fauquier County, which previously served as a United States Army and National Security Agency facility. The site played a critical role in eavesdropping on enemy communications during World War II, when it intercepted a message that helped lead to the D-Day invasion of Normandy. The new care center will deliver top-quality care to Virginia veterans in a home-like setting. The 128-bed facility will feature all private rooms that will be organized into households and neighborhoods that surround a central community center.
