Veterans Day: The Forgotten History of America's Veterans Day and What It Commemorates

For the first time in 20 plus years, our Armed Forces' young men and women will commemorate Veterans Day at peace rather than the battlefront of armed con-

flict. Those who answered the call stood in the gap, sacrificing life, limbs, health, and family. I "Salute" you for a "Job Well Done!" Rest easy on this day the country has set aside to pay its' Respect for your dedication, commitment, and love of country. God Bless!

Veterans Day, celebrated each year on November 11, was first celebrated on this same date in 1919, under Armistice Day. The holiday is in Remembrance of the temporary ceasefire that brought about the unofficial end to World War I. The Allied forces purportedly entered a truce with the Germans, halting live battle on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918.

A year later, and nearly five months after the official end of the First World War (which occurred on June 28, 1919, with the Treaty of Versailles), President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed November 11 the first commemoration with the following:

"To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with the gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

He called for parades and public gatherings and a moment of silence at 11 a.m. Two years later, on November 11, 1921, an unidentified American soldier was buried at Arlington National Cemetery in what became known as the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Celebrating America's Heroes: Armistice Day

It wasn't just the United States that remembered the end of the Great War; countries worldwide celebrated Armistice Day in 1919, and many still do today. In Canada, they call it Remembrance Day, and Great Britain celebrates Remembrance Sunday on the second Sunday of each November.

In 1926, a Congressional resolution was passed, making Armistice Day a recurring federal holiday, stating that it should be "commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through goodwill and mutual understanding between nations." As a side note, the federal government can't force the states into celebrating a holiday, as it's not within its jurisdiction, but most states adopt the federal holiday calendar.

Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on November 11, 1919, the first anni-

Mary Corkhill versary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an

annual observance, and on November 11 became a national holiday beginning in 1938. Unlike Memorial Day, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans - living or deceased - but especially gives thanks to living veterans who served their county honorably during war or peacetime.

The activities for Veterans Day in November will be as follows: on Saturday, November 6th the Post will host a breakfast starting at 7:00 AM and the Manassas Veterans Day parade will start at 11:00 AM. On Thursday, November 11th the Post and Auxiliary will lay a wreath at the Manassas Veterans Memorial at 8:30 AM and at the Manassas cemetery, the 9:00 AM ceremony will start by laying a wreath at Francis Cannon's gravesite and then replacing flags on all of the veterans' graves.



Thanksgiving Day is a national holiday celebrating the harvest and other blessings of the past year. The traditional fare of the Thanksgiving meal typically includes turkey, bread stuffing, potatoes, cranberries,

and pumpkin pie. With respect to travelers, the holiday is often the busiest time of the year, as family members gather with one another. This year Thanksgiving Day will be celebrated on Thursday, November 25.

The 8th District meeting will be at the Manassas Post 7589 on November 13. Celebrating America's Veterans: Veterans Day

Perhaps the Allied forces showed too much sympathy with the Treaty of Versailles. At signing the documents ending the war, much of the Allied troops had returned home seven months earlier after the armistice in November. And no one, not the United States nor Britain nor France, wanted to remain in Germany or Austria to enforce the terms of the Treaty. What's more, the Treaty did not require an unconditional surrender; the German troops, although defeated, were not disbanded.

Marshal Ferdinand Foch of France embittered Allied forces, supreme commander, presciently concluded the Versailles settlement: "*This is not peace. It is an armistice for 20 years.*"

Foch proved right. Twenty years after the 1919 settlement, the German army under Hitler – himself a decorated veteran of World War I- helped spin the yarn that the German military hadn't been defeated in the field. But, betrayed by the Jews at home – they invaded Poland to start World War II, which would cost the world roughly *four times as many lives* as World War I.

This time, over 16 million American soldiers, a whopping 42 percent of war-aged men, headed out to battle. And while we lost over 400,000 to the war, many of those men and women returned home. Shortly after that, tension began to rise in Korea, and by 1950, the Korean War began.

At the end of the summer of 1953, after the Korean War ended, about one in every two service-age men were veterans, and Armistice Day would be officially be changed to Veterans Day – honoring all veterans from all wars.

Changing Throughout the Years: Veterans Day Today

Throughout the years, Veterans Day has changed, sometimes to its benefit and sometimes not. For example, in 1968, it switched to Mondays in hopes of encouraging travel and tourism.

A century from the original Remembrance of Armistice Day, the holiday remains celebrated on November 11. However, if the 11th day of the 11th month falls on a Saturday, the previous Friday becomes a holiday. If on a Sunday, the holiday is on the following Monday.

Different areas celebrate Veterans Day in different ways. There are parades and celebrations to honor veterans. Perhaps the most iconic is the annual wreath-laying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Many areas still observe a moment of silence at 11 a.m. to remember all veterans, those that are still here, those that have gone on, and those that never made it home. It's also not uncommon to see the American flag flown at half-mast.

Regardless of political leanings, Veterans Day is about recognizing the dedication and sacrifice of America's veterans. If you want to show support, attend a parade. Visit a VA hospital and spend some time talking to the men and women unable to celebrate with you. Remember when you see a vet, shake their hand, and thank them for their service.

Youth Committee Update

Veterans Day week activities as well as the Annual Educational Awards Night in December were also addressed.

We are currently in the process of collecting, logging in and judging applications for Patriot's Pen, Voice of Democracy and Teacher of the Year. As you know the VFW sponsors these contests annually with a long tradition of recognizing Americanism, Patriotism and service among our students and teachers.

Patriot's Pen is open to 6th, 7th and 8th graders and requires each student to submit a written essay of 300-400 words. This year's theme is "How Can I Be A Good American?" Last year 138,000 students participated nationally in the contest and scholarship awards totaled \$55,000.

Voice of Democracy is our contest for high school age students and last year nearly 57,000 students competed for more than \$2,000,000 in scholarships. The top prize is a \$30,000 college scholarship. This year's theme is "America: Where Do We Go From Here?" The applicant is asked to submit a typed essay along with an audio recording on an audio file. The audio recording must be three to five minutes in duration. Both contests require the student to submit an application along with the essay.

Our Teacher of the Year contest recognizes teachers who care about America and teach citizenship education topics regularly and promote America's history and traditions effectively. Teachers who promote civic responsibility, flag etiquette and patriotism are prime candidates for this award. Elementary, junior high and high school teachers are invited to compete. Teachers are first nominated and are then required to submit documentation regarding their teaching activities which demonstrate their commitment to Americanism and patriotism. Awards and prizes are given to all contest winners at all levels of the competition with the National award for the first place winner totaling \$1,000 for both the teacher and their school.

The deadline for all three contests was 31 October. Consequently, the Youth Committee is extremely busy collecting and judging completed applications. If you would like to help us judge the contests please let me or any one on the Youth Committee know as soon as possible. All Post judging must be completed by 15 November and all District judging must be completed by 5 December. Our last deadline is Department judging which must be finished NLT 22 December. All finalists at the Department

level will be recognized at the Awards Banquet at the Winter Council meeting in Portsmouth, Virginia on 8 January 2022.

Alex Bliem provided us with the following Scouting report. He mentions that the Scouts recently had their Fall Camporee at Verdun Adventure Bound in Rixeyville, Va. The Scouts won 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in various cooking competitions. This is a good reflection on their teamwork and leadership. The Scouts and Pack also had their Halloween parties with lots of games and refreshments. They had a great time together and much fun. All Scout units are preparing for a busy November and December with Veterans Day activities, service projects for the holidays and numerous camping, hiking and rock climbing activities. Specifically, on Veterans Day the Scouts traditionally participate in the wreath laying ceremony at the grave of Francis Cannon and with graveside flag placements at the Manassas Cemetery.

Just a reminder about our Annual Educational Awards Ceremony which recognizes our Post youth and teacher contest winners. This year it is scheduled for Sunday, 5 December at the Post at 4:00 PM. Through the efforts of Comrade Peter MacLeod I am pleased to announce that this year's guest speaker will be Mayor Michelle Davis-Younger from the city of Manassas. Civil War veteran finally gets a headstone

Comrade Jerry Martin took a lead role in securing a headstone for a Civil War veteran who had been buried in an unmarked grave.

Comrade Martin had worked for over a year to obtain an official headstone for a Civil War Veteran who died tragically in an accident (In 1917 he was hit by a train picking up coal to heat his home) and was buried in an unmarked grave. The VA finally provided one that was an exact replica of the original type provided to Civil War veterans.

The Veteran was Sgt. John Humphrey, Co A. 4th Ohio Volunteer Cavalry who served from 1861 to 1865. He was always present for duty in over 12 battles and was even a POW for a short time.

Inasmuch as DD-214s did not exist during the time of Humphrey's service, documentation from the state of Ohio and information from the National Archives was submitted to the VA to verify his service.

The Sons of Union Veterans, Ohio Department had been in touch with Miami Township and planned to provide appropriate military honors for placement of the headstone when notified by cemetery personnel.

On Oct. 23rd his headstone was finally placed in Miami Township, Ohio. Comrade Martin was invited to speak at the ceremony which was well attended by several veterans groups as well as members of the public.


Manassas proclaims November Veterans Appreciation Month

On October 4th, 52 members of the Lifelong Learning Institute of Manassas (LLI) visited the home of Post Chaplain Ronald S. Knowles. LLI is an educational and social organization open to adults over the age of 50. They offer a wide range of classes, discussion groups, social events, and trips.

Wittman, Case Introduce the BRAVE Act

WASHINGTON, D.C. - [On October 12] Congressman Rob Wittman (R-VA) and Congressman Ed Case (D-HI) announced the introduction of H.R. 5548, the Be Ready to Assist Veterans in Extremis Act (BRAVE Act) to create a notification system that can notify select veterans of counseling and mental health options in response to crises.

The BRAVE Act would direct the Department of Veterans Affairs to establish a system for patient outreach relating to mental health care while giving the Department of Veterans Affairs the freedom to implement the system as they see best. Additionally, this legislation would prioritize privacy concerns of Veterans by allowing them to opt-in to receive these notifications.

"Many of our nation's veterans carry invisible scars from their incredible sacrifices in pursuit of the freedoms that we are allowed each and every day," said Congressman Wittman (VA-01). "We owe these selfless heroes a debt that can never be fully repaid. By empowering the Department of Veterans Affairs to create this critical outreach program, those who sacrificed for our country will not only have the tools they need, but will also be reminded that their service will never be forgotten."

"The clear shortcomings in our health care system to address the mental health needs of our veterans can be tragically seen in their disproportionate rates of suicide and homelessness," said Congressman Ed Case (HI-01). "Enactment of the BRAVE Act will do more than just address this unacceptable gap; it is indispensable to repaying our debt to those who selflessly served our country."

Virginia VFW Honors USS COLE Sailors

On October 12, 2000, the USS COLE (DDG-67) was pier side in the harbor of Aden, Yemen for what seemed like a routine evolution: refueling. Sailors on the ship that day recall lunch being served with the normal delay to refill trays in the mess line. There were routine security watches in place consistent with guidance for the time. However, this was not to last.

A small boat packed with explosives and driven by terrorists aligned with Al-Qaeda was driven towards the port side of the ship and the explosives were detonated. 17 sailors were killed and an-

other 37 injured in the deadliest attack against a U.S. Navy ship since 1987. The attack on the USS COLE, which came 11 months before the attacks on September 11, 2001 is historically seen as yet another action by a terrorist group the U.S. continues to fight today. However, those sailors killed are not forgotten; the VFW ensures their legacy of service and sacrifice is kept alive.

Across Virginia, a number of the sailors killed are buried. In keeping with the wishes of their families, the VFW honors many with wreaths placed on their graves and by their spot in a columbarium. Each wreath contains 17 white roses for the 17 sailors killed. Four are buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Another, who had only been on the ship for 60 days and had a pregnant fiancé, is buried in Newport News, just a few miles from where he grew up and near where his mother and the son he never met live today. These sailors were junior and senior in rank, new and not-so-new by years of service, but all were far from home ensuring the principles of democracy and freedom were well represented.

Leading the VFW's delegation at Arlington National Cemetery was State Senior Vice Commander Geoff Lyster, who was joined

has been 21 years because the service of these sailors is still just as honorable, and their loss is still just as painful".

Commander Lippold said he was touched by the continued commitment of the VFW. "It means so much to me personally that you continue to send the wreaths and attend the ceremonies".

The ship, which was later adopted by the VFW's National HQs through its "Adopt-a-Unit" program, was repaired and returned to sea, where she still serves. The ship commemorates the memory of those lost in several ways and holds their own ceremonies annually. Additional wreaths are placed by VFW Posts 4809 and 5500 from Norfolk and Hampton, respectively.

Regardless of the time that may go by, the VFW continues to fulfill its commitment to remember those who serve and sacrifice while in the military as well as their families. The attack on the USS COLE is an event many of us remember well and those sailors will continue to live on in the minds and hearts of both their families and all of us.

Amazon impersonators: what you need Social Security Announces 5.9 Percent to know

Has Amazon contacted you to confirm a recent purchase you didn't make or to tell you that your account has been hacked? According to the FTC's new Data Spotlight, since July 2020, about one in three people who have reported a business impersonator scam say the scammer pretended to be Amazon.

These scams can look a few different ways. In one version, scammers offer to "refund" you for an unauthorized purchase but "accidentally transfer" more than promised. They then ask you to send back the difference. What really happens? The scammer moves your own money from one of your bank accounts to the other (like your Savings to Checking, or vice versa) to make it look like you were refunded. Any money you send back to "Amazon" is your money (not an overpayment) - and as soon as you send it out of your account, it becomes theirs. In another version of the scam, you're told that hackers have gotten access to your account — and the only way to supposedly protect it is to buy gift cards and share the gift card number and PIN on the back. Once that information is theirs, the money is, too.

Here are some ways to avoid an Amazon impersonator scam:

Never call back an unknown number. Use the information on Amazon's website and not a number listed in an unexpected email or text.

Don't pay for anything with a gift card. Gift cards are for gifts. If anyone asks you to pay with a gift card - or buy gift cards for anything other than a gift, it's a scam.

Don't give remote access to someone who contacts you unexpectedly. This gives scammers easy access to your personal and financial information-like access to your bank accounts.

Have you spotted this scam? Report it at <u>ReportFraud.ftc.gov</u>.

If you think someone has gotten access to your accounts or personal information, visit IdentityTheft.gov. There, you'll find steps to take to see if your identity has been misused, and how to report and recover from identity theft.

Benefit Increase for 2022

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits



for approximately 70 million Americans will increase 5.9 percent in 2022, the Social Security Administration announced today. The 5.9 percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits payable to more than 64 million Social Security beneficiaries in January 2022. Increased payments to approximately 8 million SSI beneficiaries will begin on December 30, 2021. (Note: some people receive both Social Security and SSI benefits). The Social Security Act ties the annual COLA to the increase in the Consumer Price Index as determined by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Some other adjustments that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax (taxable maximum) will increase to \$147,000 from \$142,800.

Social Security and SSI beneficiaries are normally notified by mail starting in early December about their new benefit amount. Most people who receive Social Security payments will be able to view their COLA notice online through their personal my Social Security account. People may create or access their my Social Security account online at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

Information about Medicare changes for 2022, when announced, will be available at www.medicare.gov. For Social Security beneficiaries receiving Medicare, Social Security will not be able to compute their new benefit amount until after the Medicare premium amounts for 2022 are announced. Final 2022 benefit amounts will be communicated to beneficiaries in December through the mailed COLA notice and my Social Security's Message Center.


